About ISE

The Institute for Science Education (ISE) is embedded in The Faculty of Science (Faculteit der Natuurwetenschappen, Wiskunde en Informatica; FNWI) of Radboud University. FNWI is responsible for research and teaching in biology, physics, astronomy, chemistry, mathematics and computer sciences. ISE is one of the eight research institutes at FNWI. Both in research and in education ISE collaborates with the other FNWI institutes as well with the Radboud Teachers Academy, which provides university degree programs in teaching in all secondary school subjects.

Research at ISE

ISE's research focuses on subject-specific thinking in science subjects and on practical knowledge and skills of science teachers. We pay special attention to research in the context of subject-specific and educational innovations. Ongoing research themes include design-based learning, scientific literacy and citizenship education, digital literacy and computational thinking, education for sustainable development and teachers' pedagogical content knowledge. Many of our research projects are practice-based and conducted together with stakeholders in practice, especially Dutch schools.

Much of the research is design research, producing both scientific knowledge and concrete educational products. This design research is conducted with partners in educational practice, in particular educational institutions and teachers. Within this research profile, a range of activities is carried out. Most of the current (externally funded) research projects take place in the context of upper secondary schools. The research is mostly subject-specific. Currently, efforts are being made to strengthen the existing research profile. We are doing this in two ways: broadening the context of the research with university science education and expanding the content to an overarching theme requiring an interdisciplinary and STEM approach.

Education at ISE

ISE provides an elective minor program in subject-specific science (STEM) pedagogy for undergraduate students in the science faculty. This minor is a good way for students to discover whether teaching suits them. But the content of this minor can also be useful for students who are not going to study teacher training: knowledge

of science education comes in handy wherever learning and communicating about subject matter plays a role. The minor is offered in Dutch.

Furthermore, the institute plays a role in the Master's degree program in Education in Science, which is organized by the Radboud Teachers Academy. Within this Master's degree program, ISE is responsible for coordinating, developing and implementing the subject content component (30 ec for each school subject). This subject content component is designed in collaboration with the educational institutes in the faculty. These teaching activities require a strong disciplinary approach and thus specific expertise in mathematics, physics, chemistry, biology and computer science content and didactics. In addition, the program includes cross-curricular components such as research methodology, research supervision, and the institute works with the Radboud Teachers Academy on linking courses.

Currently, the institute is broadening its teaching activities. We want subject-specific pedagogical expertise in the institute to benefit the continuing of professional development in instructional and pedagogical approaches of teaching staff in the faculty.

ISE also plans to play a leading role in the pedagogical, instructional training of student assistants. To this end, we will determine and steer the content of the existing range of training courses and thus cooperate closely with the Education Centre and the various educational institutes.

Outreach at ISE

The Radboud Pre-University College (PUC) of Science acts as a bridge between secondary schools and university and organizes deepening and enriching science activities for students and teachers in secondary schools. The PUC also provides a practice environment for courses of the institute.

The [program of the Radboud PUC of Science](#) is offered in Dutch, therefore the content information is only in Dutch.

Institutional embedding of PhD candidates

Our PhD candidates are very important for ISE's research and innovation strength. Proper embedding in the institute is therefore of great importance for both ISE and the PhDs. ISE's PhDs hold monthly PhD lunch-meetings to discuss opportunities, experiences and obstacles that pass by as well as your work-in-progress.

Furthermore, there are two PhD councils at Radboud. The Nijmegen PhD Council PON (Promovendi Overleg Nijmegen; <https://www.ru.nl/pon/>) is the consultative body for all PhD candidates at the Radboud University and the Radboud UMC. PON is managed by PhD candidates of Radboud University and Radboud UMC and is the first point of contact for all matters at the RU level. PON's three main objectives are to inform PhD candidates (about their rights, the procedures about obtaining a PhD, and all practical matters of living and working in Nijmegen), to organize social activities for PhD candidates, and to promote the interests of Nijmegen PhD candidates within the university.

PROBE (<http://www.ru.nl/science/more/information/phd-students/>) is the council for PhD candidates working at the Faculty of Science of Radboud University. It is established for the PhD candidates at the Faculty of Science (FNWI). PROBE guards the interests of the PhD candidates and provides relevant news.

Research ethics and integrity

Research integrity is one of the pillars underpinning good science. Within our institute we have created an open atmosphere in which research integrity issues are discussed and novel challenges to integrity are collectively addressed.

We would like to draw your attention to the Dutch Research Code of Conduct. The Dutch code of conduct for academic and scientific practice was compiled at the request of the Association of Universities in the Netherlands (VSNU). It is based on the following principles:

- **Honesty:** Academic practitioners are honest and forthright about their research and its applications.
- **Scrupulousness:** Scientific and scholarly activities are performed scrupulously and should remain unaffected by the pressure to achieve.
- **Reliability:** Every academic practitioner supports and strengthens the fundamental reliability of science and scholarship through their own conduct. Academic practitioners conduct and report on their research and transfer their knowledge through teaching and publishing in a reliable manner.
- **Transparency:** Whenever research results are published, it is made clear what the data and conclusions are based on, from where they originate and how they can be verified.
- **Independence:** Academic practitioners operate in a context of academic freedom and independence. Where restriction of this freedom cannot be avoided, it is clearly stated.
- **Responsibility:** Acknowledging the fact that a researcher does not operate in isolation and hence taking into consideration the legitimate interests of human (or animal) test subjects, as well as those of commissioning parties, funding bodies and the environment. Responsibility also means conducting research that is scientifically and/or societally relevant.

Research Data Management

Research data management refers to the ways in which research data are collected, stored, shared, protected, and made available, either for re-use or for verification. The Research Data Management (RDM) policy of the Radboud University states that all data corresponding with scientific publications must be stored according to the principles of findable and accessible. The consequent ISE Data Management Policy provides guidelines and advice on proper ways of managing data, in all phases and for all forms of research that takes place at ISE.

Your role

All researchers at ISE are responsible for the acquisition, documentation and storage of their own research data. In most cases, this means that your research plans for every study, have to be approved by the [ethics committee](#) beforehand. For research with (data of) human participants (e.g. teachers, students) it is usually necessary to obtain and record their informed consent. On the [RDM Support website](#), information can be found concerning informed consent procedures. This website also contains recommendations about the content of informed consent forms and information brochures, including references to examples and formats.

At the start of your time at ISE, meet the ISE data steward (Mara Saeli, mara.saeli@ru.nl) and discuss how data are produced and can be stored in a findable and accessible way, with respect of the privacy of respondents. Make sure that whilst working on your PhD project, you adhere to the procedures of our data management plan. Please be aware that when leaving the university, your data remain property of the university. You should therefore make sure that all your data are stored in the manner described.

In addition, by the end of the first year, you write a Research Data Management plan, in which you describe how you are planning to manage your data. It can be uploaded to Hora Finita as an attachment at your 12 month evaluation.

Supervision and coaching

All our PhD researchers are supervised by a team of at least 2 staff members, usually a combination of a full professor (promotor) and an assistant/associate professor (copromotor/daily supervisor).

You meet with your supervisors on a regular basis. Together, you agree on how often it is necessary to meet. For example, you may meet weekly with your 'daily' supervisor(s) and once a month with all supervisors. During these meetings with your supervisors, you can discuss progress and address challenges.

We encourage PhD researchers to participate, present and discuss their research in academic conferences, both nationally and internationally, to allow them to develop their profile, position themselves in the research landscape and foster visibility. Funding is available for taking part in some international conferences, provided this conference is useful for your PhD track. Especially in the later years of your PhD, you are expected to present a paper or poster at the conference. Discuss with your supervisors which conferences are useful to attend.

Confidential counselling

The role of the confidential advisor is, for example:

- to act as go-to person for PhD candidates who experience a problem or conflict in relation to their training, support and/or evaluation;
- to mediate, in consultation with the PhD candidate, for the most suitable solution to solve an issue.

Hora Finita

To monitor all running PhD trajectories and to handle all formal correspondence associated with PhD graduations, Radboud University is using the Hora Finita PhD project monitoring system. Hora Finita assists PhD-candidates, their supervisors and the support staff from start to finish of the PhD project. At the start of your PhD appointment you will receive an email with the request to register in Hora Finita. Hora Finita “finds” its users, PhD’s and their supervisors, in Radboud’s customer relationship management system. You can log in with SURFconext on <https://horafinita.ru.nl>. This step arranges the formal admittance to the PhD graduation procedure and thus it is very important.

Hora Finita is also used to monitor the PhD trajectories: each year you must upload your updated Training and Supervision Plan (TSP) and updated Graduation Plan (GP), as well as the planning and the evaluation form via this system. Close to the completion of the PhD, other formal steps, such as the selection of the manuscript committee, the approval of the manuscript, and the reservation of the defense date, are also all handled via Hora Finita. Graduate School

All PhD candidates at Radboud University are required to be part of a graduate research school. All PhD candidates who do research at ISE are automatically enrolled in the ISE Graduate School. The aim of the Graduate School is to offer all ISE PhD candidates a complete program and support for academic development in this phase of their career.

PhD candidates can also choose to join another national graduate research school. For example, the Dudoc-Bèta training program or the ICO research school. Discuss with your supervisors which graduate school is most relevant for you.

Training & Supervision Plan (TSP) and Graduation Plan (GP)

The aim of the ISE Graduate School is that you finish your PhD in a smooth way. To help you with this, you will write a Training & Supervision Plan (TSP) and Graduation Plan (GP) at the start of your project, and hand it in at the start of your PhD track.

The TSP is the 'contract' you make with your supervisors. The TSP comprises issues like research strategy, frequency of contacts with the supervisors, courses to be followed, and teaching tasks to be performed. You can evaluate and update your TSP every year. The initial version of the TSP should be uploaded to Hora Finita 3 months after the start of your PhD project.

The Graduation Plan describes the planned research. You describe the background and motivation for the research, the main research question(s) and your approach that you plan to use to answer these questions. Furthermore, the GP contains a description of the planning and deliverables for each year of your PhD track. You complete the GP after 9 months, and then you discuss it with your supervisors. At the 12 month annual evaluation, you can upload the (updated) form to Hora Finita.

Personal training and development

Within the Graduate School, you have the opportunity to receive training, develop your personal and professional skills, and prepare for your future career. This section describes the framework of the ISE Graduate School training program. The

study load of the training should be approximately 560 hours in total, which is 20 EC. When completed, PhD candidates receive a Graduate School certificate.

You will largely compose the training program yourself (in consultation with your supervisors). Some courses are mandatory for ISE PhD candidates.

You can participate in the courses offered by the Faculty of Science (more information and registration via [this page](#)) and/or follow courses of the standard training program for PhDs at Radboud University (via the [gROW learning environment](#)). It is also possible to complete (some) courses on the same topics at another graduate or research school. Please signal this in your TSP.

At ISE we recommend the following courses:

Educational tasks

Furthermore, every PhD candidate is expected to spend time with supporting educational tasks. Teaching includes supervision of students and providing (guest) lectures. In this manner, you become well embedded in the daily work of the institute, and it allows you to develop educational experience and skills.

To prepare you for the supporting educational tasks, each PhD candidate at the science faculty is required to complete a short course on didactic skills. Make sure to discuss this with your supervisor, and include participation in this course in your TSP.

You may consider getting your university teaching qualification (UTQ) or “Basis kwalificatie onderwijs” (BKO). A BKO may be useful if you consider a career at a university or ‘hogeschool’.

Make sure you discuss the teaching load over the four years with your supervisors and include it in your TSP.

Progress monitoring

As an indication of good progress, we give you the following milestones:

When	What
Start	Register in Hora Finita
After 3 months	Have completed your Training and Supervision Plan (TSP). Discuss it with your supervisors and upload it to Hora Finita
After 9 months	Have completed your Graduation Plan, and Research Data Management plan. Discuss it with your supervisors and upload it to Hora Finita at the first annual evaluation.
After 1 year	Have a formal assessment, the go/no go-interview. Upload the first year evaluation form to Hora Finita. Include the Graduation Plan, Research Data Management plan and updated TSP as an attachment.
18 months	Official go/no go decision
After 2 years	Evaluation of the past year and planning for next year. Upload it to Hora Finita.
After 3 years	Evaluation of the past year and planning for next year. Upload it to Hora Finita.
Beginning of the last year (Year 4)	Agree with your supervisor(s) on a date for finishing the manuscript
The last 6 months of your contract	To be spend on writing the synthesis and the introduction of your thesis and preparing for submission

Annual evaluation

At least every 12 months you and your supervisors evaluate the progress and planning of the project, in the so-called planning and evaluation interview. This

is also a good moment to discuss your needs for supervision with your supervisor(s). Make sure that you update your Training and Supervision Plan as well as your Graduation Plan during or after this meeting and that you complete the planning and evaluation forms. The second assessor can be invited to these evaluations if you or your supervisors prefer this.

Go/No Go interview

At the end of the first year, the planning and evaluation interview has a more formal status: an assessment of the PhD candidate, will take place in order to decide upon the continuation or, in rare cases, termination of the project. This is called the go/no go-assessment. The complete supervision team, including the second assessor, takes part in this assessment. One week before the assessment, you send relevant information such as the Training and Supervision Plan, the Graduation plan, evaluation form for the first year and planning form of the second year to the supervision team. In the unfortunate case that the outcome is a 'no go', your contract will be terminated after 18 months of the start of the project thus leaving about 6 months for finding an appointment elsewhere.

External or part-time PhD candidates

ISE supervises a number of external PhD candidates. External PhD candidates often work in an organization outside the university (for instance a secondary school) and are therefore instrumental for maintaining contacts with societal stakeholders. Our ambition to educate interdisciplinary, critical and engaged scholars also holds for external PhD researchers, although as a rule they do not contribute to teaching as often as internal PhD candidates, and progress meetings are less frequent. Yet, we expect them to present lectures during colloquia and meet other employees of ISE. A tailor-made training and supervision plan (TSP) is also required for external PhD researchers.

Finalizing your PhD project

The requirements for a PhD graduation at ISE are in line with the RU Regulations for PhD graduations. These regulations can be downloaded from the RU website. A PhD thesis usually consists of 3-5 publishable or published chapters. The PhD candidate is first author for several of these chapters.

After 48 months (on the basis of full time employment) the PhD project must be completed, which means that the thesis manuscript must be submitted to the manuscript committee.

Printing costs of the PhD thesis may be reimbursed up to a certain maximum. On the website of the personnel department (P&O) an application form can be downloaded. This form should be submitted within 6 months after the printing of the thesis.

Delay

If after 48 months your thesis manuscript is not yet ready for submission, you and your supervisors should draft a pragmatic planning for finishing the manuscript as soon as possible.

Extensions of PhD-contracts are rarely awarded and only in exceptional circumstances. A prerequisite for considering an extension application is that the PhD supervisor(s) provide(s) the required budget for the extension. A request for prolongation should be handed in to the ISE Board several months before the contract termination date.

In the unfortunate case that your PhD project is delayed severely, try and work out a new schedule with your supervisor. You may submit a plan to complete the manuscript within 12 months one year after the end of the formal employment (and signed by the you and your supervisor).

Feedback to ISE

ISE also wants to learn. We want to know what we do well and what we can improve for PhD candidates, specifically for issues related to the PhD training. By the end of your PhD, you are invited by the PhD coordinator for a feedback interview. In this meeting you can share your view and give feedback on your experiences within the institute. The interview is confidential.
